

175th Anniversary

San Joaquin County is proud to be celebrating its 175th anniversary this year with a theme of "175 Years of Growing Greatness." As one of California's original counties from when the state joined the Union, San Joaquin County has a deep and rich history.

Prior to the gold rush, San Joaquin County was inhabited by Yokuts and Miwok people, who lived off of the fish, acorns and native plants for food. In 1843, the Mexican government of California granted Charles Weber a large piece of land for settlement in what is now French Camp. From there, Weber went on to found the City of Stockton, alongside the native people's leader, Jose Jesus.

During the gold rush, Stockton and San Joaquin County grew to be an agricultural and economic hub, especially the City of Stockton, with its inland water ways. Once considered a wild and untamed place, with innovation and the industrial revolution, the county became a transportation center and was able to provide industrial and agricultural jobs to many.

Now, at the crossroads of California, San Joaquin County is growing once again, as bedroom communities to the East Bay and Sacramento region flourish among the cherry and almond orchards, vineyards, and fields that feed the world.

As a county of vibrant diversity, San Joaquin brings together immigrants from all over the world. This rich blend of cultures has strengthened and enriched our community in ways our founders could never have imagined.

We look forward to this year, as our community embarks on a journey to learn more about our history, celebrate our heritage, and look to the future for continued growth and opportunity.
